We, the undersigned, persons appointed, by the
within Order of Court, to view, and lay out the
Road therein mentioned. Respectfully report.

That having given notice of the time and place of
Meeting. According to the act of Assembly. And being
all present, at the view of the ground proposed for
the said road; And being all sworn, or affir-
med in pursuance of the said Order of Court.
We have viewed, and laid out; and do return
the following road, viz. Beginning at a Post, by marked
trees, at the end of a public road formerly laid out by Order of
Court, from Between "Ritting Run" and Newburg. (and now in use)

At a Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace of the county of Clearfield, held at Clearfield, in and for said county, on the 20th day of January A. D.

1881, before Judges of said Court, upon a petition of sundry inhabitants of the Township of Chest Greendwood in said county, setting forth that for want of a

Road or Highway to lead from the Public road along the Susquehanna River near John W. Bell in Greenwood Township, to the Public Road between Rattling Run and Newburg in said borough

and therefore praying the Court to appoint proper persons to view and lay out the same according to law, and make report to the Court whereupon the Court, upon due consideration had of the premises, do order and appoint John W. Bell and W. Moore and S. J. McCloskey who, after being respectively sworn or affirmed to perform the duties of their appointment with impartiality and fidelity, are to view the grounds proposed for said road, and if they view the same and any two of the actual viewers agree that there is occasion for such road, they shall proceed to lay out the same agreeable to the desire of the petitioners, as may be, having respect to the best ground for a road and the shortest distance, and in such manner as to do least injury to private property, and state particularly whether they judge the same necessary for a public or private road, together with a plot or draft of the same, with the courses and distances and reference to the improvements through which it passes, and shall also procure releases of damages from persons through whose lands said road may pass, or failing to procure such releases, shall assess the same, if any sustained, and shall make report thereof to the next Court of Quarter Sessions to be held for the said county, in which report they shall state that they have been sworn and affirmed according to law. Notice is directed to be given to the owners or occupants of seated lands through which the within road is intended to pass, of the time of the view, according to the 147th rule of Court.
