

To the Honorable Judges within named
We the undersigned Viewers appointed by the
foregoing Order of Court to View the road therein
described. Do Report that in pursuance of said
Appointment and order after having first
given due notice of the time & place of meeting for
said view. we all met and being duly sworn and
affirmed according to Law we did proceed to view
the ground for said proposed road and being of the
opinion that such road was necessary. we have
viewed laid out and do return for Public use
the following Road Viz Beginning at a Post on
a Public road down Potts Run on lands of Reuben
Caldwell then North thirty two - (32) Degrees West twenty
four & eight tenths (24.8) Perches to a Beech. Then North
Sixteen (16) Degrees west, thirty six & five tenths (36.5)
Perches to a Hem^c Stump. Then through land of H. T.
Robison North twenty eight (28) degrees west Twenty
& one half (20 $\frac{1}{2}$) Perches to a Hemlock North thirty
two & three fourths. (32 $\frac{3}{4}$) Degrees West Fifty (50)
Perches to a Post. Thence North Forty one (41) De-
grees West, Sixty seven (67) Perches to a small Beech
then South Seventy two & one half (72 $\frac{1}{2}$) degrees west
Nineteen (19) Perches to a Hemlock. Then through
land of Peter Mays North eighty nine (89) degrees
West Twenty (20) Perches to a Hemlock. Then North
Seventy five (75) degrees West Forty (40) Perches to a
Hemlock. Thence North eighty four (84) degrees west

Seventy (70) Perches to a Sugar Grub
thence North Fifty five & one half (55 $\frac{1}{2}$)
Degrees West. Twenty (20) Perches to a
Post. thence Through land of Jacob Arnold
North thirty nine (39) Degrees West—
Fifteen (15) Perches to a Post. thence South
twelve & one half (12 $\frac{1}{2}$) Degrees West Twenty Two
(22) Perches to a Pine. thence North twenty one & one half
(21 $\frac{1}{2}$) Degrees West Forty two (42) Perches to a Post on
line of Mr. Wise thence Through said Wise land. North
Twenty Eight (28) Degrees East Twelve (12) Perches to
interior-Public road. from Ansonville to Lenoirville
a draft of which we herunto annex
having obtained releases, and assessed damages
as herein contained.

At a Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace of the county of Clearfield, held at Clearfield, in and for said county, on the 22nd day of March, A. D. 1882, before Judges of said Court, upon a petition of sundry inhabitants of the township of Knox, in said county, setting forth that,

A Public Road is necessary from a point at or near Reuben Caldwell's to a point at or near Jacob Arnolds in Knox Twp Clearfield County Penna

and therefore praying the Court to appoint proper persons to view and lay out the same according to law,

whereupon the Court, upon due consideration had of the premises, do order and appoint

W Sloppy John Morgan and J W Moore who, after being respectively sworn or affirmed to perform the duties of their appointment with impartiality and fidelity, are to view the grounds proposed for said road, and if they view the same and any two of the actual viewers agree that there is occasion for such road, they shall proceed to lay out the same agreeable to the desire of the petitioners, as may be, having respect to the best ground for a road and the shortest distance, and in such manner as to do least injury to private property, and state particularly whether they judge the same necessary for a public or private road, together with a plot or draft of the same, with the courses and distances and reference to the improvements through which it passes, and shall also procure releases of damages from persons through whose lands said road may pass, or failing to procure such releases, shall assess the same, if any sustained, and shall make report thereof to the next Court of Quarter Sessions to be held for the said county, in which report they shall state that they have been sworn and affirmed according to law. Notice is directed to be given to the owners or occupants of seated lands through which the within road is intended to pass, of the time of the view, according to the 147th Rule of Court.


ASSESSMENT OF DAMAGES.

Reviewers cannot interfere with damages assessed by
the original viewers, except so far as the location may be
changed by the viewers, where the parties are not entitled
to the same. It will be given to consideration the advantages as
well as the disadvantages of the road, these will report to
that effect.
