Also—Viewers will certify to the number of days employed and set the amount out of the cost of their return. Reviewers cannot interfere with damages assessed by the original viewers, except so far as the location may be changed by the reviewers.
N.B.—If the viewers believe the parties are not entitled to damages, taking into consideration the advantages as well as the disadvantages of the road, they will report to that effect.

At a Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace of the county of Clearfield, held at Clearfield, in and for said county, on the

16th day of Sept, A. D. 1885,

before Judges of said Court, upon a petition of sundry inhabitants of the township of Morris, in

said county, setting forth that a road has been

long since laid out from the corner of H. Haring's barn to the old state road on Jas Staples farm which road beginning as aforesaid and ending as aforesaid is about 1 1/2 miles in length and 16 feet in width and runs over hills & through valleys of heavy grade said road not having been used as a public highway to any extent since 1860 and has become useless inconvenient & burdensome to the inhabitants of said town

and therefore praying the Court to appoint proper persons to view and lay out the same according to law, & make Report to the Court whereupon the Court, upon due consideration had of the premises, do order and appoint

E. C. Read Henry Thomas & Geo H. Shirel who, after being respectively sworn or affirmed to perform the duties of their appointment with impartiality and fidelity, are to view the grounds proposed for said road, and if they view the same and any two of the actual viewers agree that there is occasion for such road, vacation vacate they shall proceed to lay out the same agreeable to the desire of the petitioners, as may be, having respect to the best ground for a road and the shortest distance, and in such manner as to do least injury to private property, and state particularly whether they judge the same necessary for a public or private road, together with a plot or draft of the same, with the courses and distances and reference to the improvements through which it passes, and shall also procure releases of damages from persons through whose lands said road may pass, or failing to procure such releases, shall assess the same, if any sustained, and shall make report thereof to the next Court of Quarter Sessions to be held for the said county, in which report they shall state that they have been sworn and affirmed according to law. Notice is directed to be given to the owners or occupants of seated lands through which the within road is intended to pass, of the time of the view, according to the 147th Rule of Court.



Waring's farm to the old state road on James Taylor's farm, which road beginning on afferside and ending as aforesaid is about one and one half mile in length and sixteen feet in breadth, and runs over hills and through valleys of heavy grade, said road has not been used as public highway to any extent since 1836, your petitioners conceive, is now become useless in convenient road, but is a curse to the inhabitants of said township.
