time laid out leading from at or near the corner
of a field of Ogden Campbell in Green-
wood Township to a point at or near the barn
of Samuel Kauffman in Bell Township

That owing to the change in railroad facilities
and for many other reasons the road is not so
laid out as to be of the greatest public advant-
age, and also that portions of said road are so
steep as to prevent a full load being hauled over
this road.

They therefore pray your
honorable Court to appoint proper persons to
view said road and vacate and supply the same
according to law.

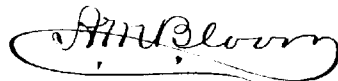
Clearfield County, ss:

At a Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace of the county of Clearfield, Pennsylvania, held at Clearfield, in and for said county, on the 12th day of September, A. D. 1887, before Judges of said Court, upon a petition of sundry inhabitants of the township of Bell & Greenwood, in said county, setting forth that a road has

been for some time laid out leading from at or near the Corner of a field of Ogden Campbells in Greenwood Township to a point at or near the Barn of Samuel Kauffman in Bell Township

and therefore praying the Court to appoint proper persons to view ^{and lay out} ~~and lay out~~ the same according to law, ^{and make report to the Court} ~~and make report to the Court~~ whereupon the Court, upon due consideration had of the premises, do order and appoint D. S. Mellosky Anthony Stille ^{and} ~~and~~ ^{as before} ~~as before~~ Bell who, after being respectively sworn or affirmed to perform the duties of their appointment with impartiality and fidelity, are to view the grounds proposed for said road, and if they view the same and any two of the actual viewers agree that there is occasion for such road, they shall proceed to lay out the same agreeable to the desire of the petitioners, as may be, having respect to the best ground for a road and the shortest distance, and in such manner as to do least injury to private property, and state particularly whether they judge the same necessary for a public or private road, together with a plot or draft of the same, with the courses and distances and reference to the improvements through which it passes, and shall also procure releases of damages from persons through whose lands said road may pass, or failing to procure such releases, shall assess the same, if any sustained, and shall make report thereof to the next Court of Quarter Sessions to be held for said county, in which report they shall state that they have been sworn and affirmed according to law. Notice is directed to be given to the owners or occupants of seated lands through which the within road is intended to pass, of the time of the view, according to the 147th Rule of Court.

We, the undersigned, persons, appointed by the Within Order of Court to view, and vacate, and supply the Road therein mentioned Respectfully report;

That having given notice, of the time, and place of meeting. According to the act of Assembly. And being all present at the view of the said road. And being all sworn, or Affirmed. in pursuance of the said Order. We have Viewed, vacated, and supplied, the following. described, road. Viz. Beginning at a Point in the Township Road leading from John W. Bees, to Maron. by a White Pine Stump marked with three notches. Near the Corner of Ogden Campbell's field. and run through his land, and land of Bees and Thompson. South forty eight degrees West; Seventeen and four tenths perches to a Post; Thence South twenty five degrees West; Six and four tenths perches to a Post; Thence South Thirty four and a half degrees West; Thirteen perches to a Post; South Seventy three degrees West; Seven and one tenth, perches to a Post; South eighty five and a half degrees West; (and at 33.6 paces 4 feet to left of Cherry Corner) Forty four perches to a Post in land of Bell and Stevenson; Thence through their land. South sixty five and a half degrees West; Nineteen and three tenths perches, to a Beech.
