At a Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace of the county of Clearfield, Pennsylvania, held at Clearfield, in and for said county, on the 15th day of September, A. D. 1880, before Judges of said Court, upon a petition of sundry inhabitants of the township of Woodward —, in said county, setting forth that they labor under great inconvenience for want of a Public road leading from a front year Rail road running on Township Road leading from Shady Dale to Oakdale Cemetery to a front at terminus of street in the Village of Moran.

and therefore praying the Court to appoint proper persons to view and lay out the same according to law, ~~to make Report at next Term~~ whereupon the Court, upon due consideration had of the premises, do order and appoint ~~Harry Dyer, W. D. Duxbury, W. W. Wornell~~ who, after being respectively sworn or affirmed to perform the duties of their appointment with impartiality and fidelity, are to view the grounds proposed for said road, and if they view the same and any two of the actual viewers agree that there is occasion for such road, they shall proceed to lay out the same agreeable to the desire of the petitioners, as may be, having respect to the best ground for a road and the shortest distance, and in such manner as to do least injury to private property, and state particularly whether they judge the same necessary for a public or private road, together with a plot or draft of the same, with the courses and distances and reference to the improvements through which it passes, and shall also procure releases of damages from persons through whose lands said road may pass, or failing to procure such releases, shall assess the same, if any sustained, and shall make report thereof to the next Court of Quarter Sessions to be held for said county, in which report they shall state that they have been sworn and affirmed according to law. Notice is directed to be given to the owners or occupants of seated lands through which the within road is intended to pass, of the time of the view, according to the 147th Rule of Court.


ASSESSMENT OF DAMAGES.

Note. — In case of a private road, the relense must be executed in favor of the petitioner for said road.
Also — Viewers will carefully note the number of days on which the road and set the amount out at the foot of their report. The viewer cannot interfere with damages assessed by the original viewer, except so far as the location may be changed by the viewers.
N. B. — If the viewers believe the parties are not entitled to damages, taking into consideration the advantages, as well as the disadvantages of the road, they will report to that effect.
