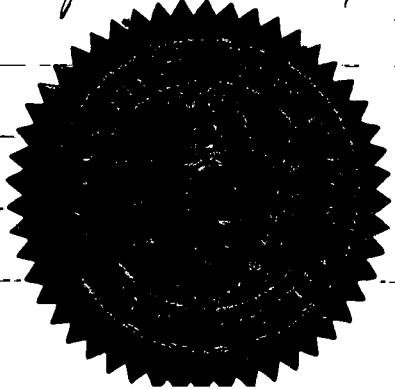

To the Hon Judge of the Court of Quarter Sessions, of Llanfairfield County.

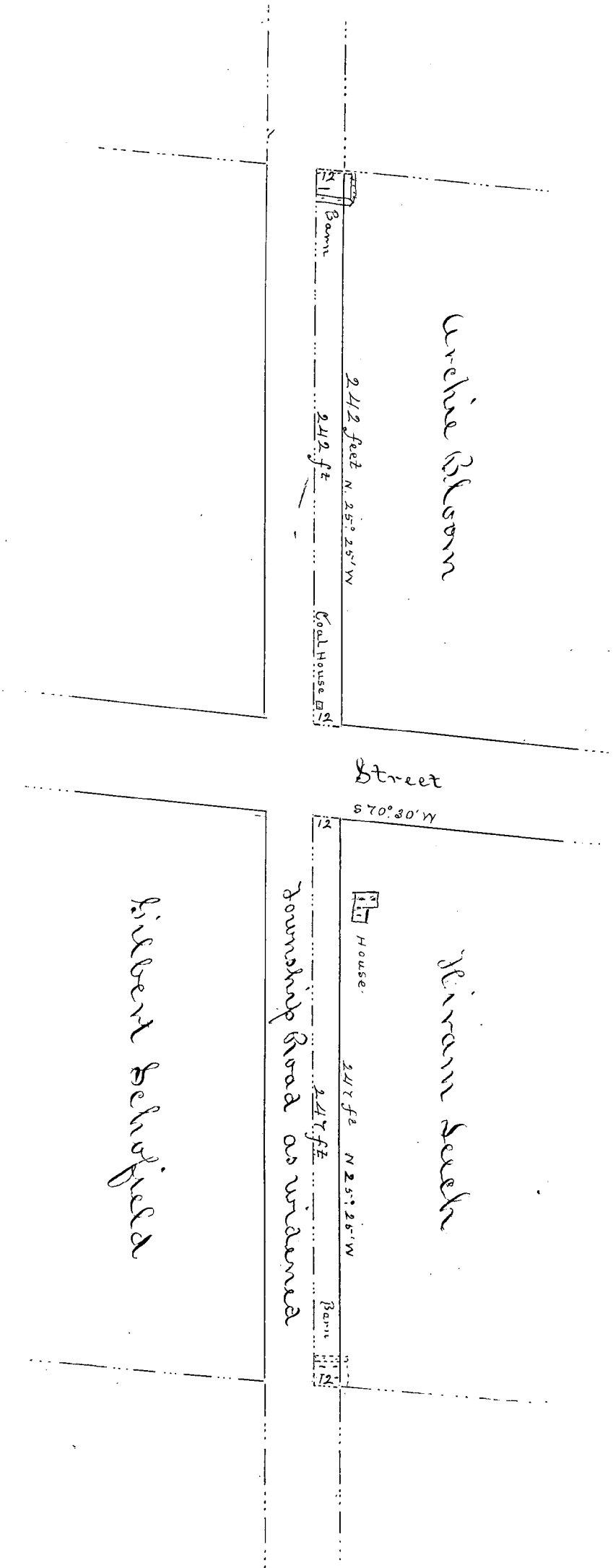
We the undersigned Viewers, Appointed by the within Order of Court to view and widen the Road therein mentioned Respectfully report.

That having given notice of the time, and place of meeting according to the act of assembly. and being all present at the view of the Road ^{or shall} proposed to be widened, and being all sworn, or affirmed in pursuance of the said Order, we have viewed the ground where the proposed Change is to be made, and find, that the said Hiram Leech's Lot is Two hundred and forty seven feet long. and that the proposed Change, will take a Strip off of said Lot, twelve feet wide for the entire length of the said Lot. And that it will require said Leech to move his Barn a distance of 12 feet. And also his fence. and will destroy six bearing Apple trees. and other shrubery.

And after Considering the Advantages, and disadvantages. We are of Opinion that the said Hiram Leech is entitled to Damage. to the Amount of Two Hundred and forty five (\$245.00) Dollars.

And we also find that Archie Bloom's Lot is two Hundred and forty two feet long, and it will take a strip off of said Lot 12 feet wide, for its entire length of 242 feet. And that it will require him to Move his Barn, Coalhouse and fence. And after Considering the Advantages, and disadvantages, we are of Opinion that the said Archie Bloom is entitled to damages. to the amount of One hundred and fifty Dollars (\$150.00) Witness our hands. the 8th day of March A.D. 1890.

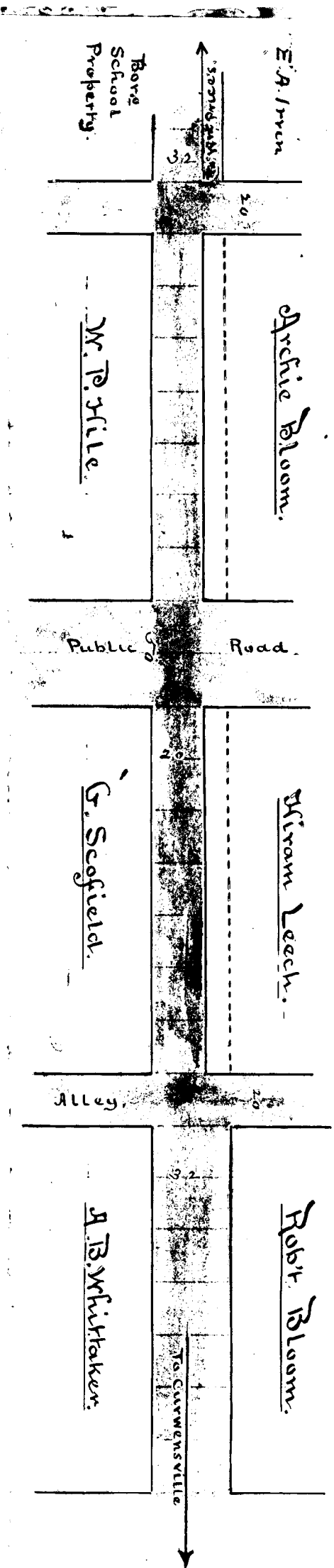

We the majority of the Grand Jury
having received satisfactory evidence of the
necessity of a public Bridge over Little
Anderson Creek in the Borough of Pennville
and being of the opinion that the expense
of erecting said Bridge would be too great
for the Borough of Pennville to bear, do

sum sufficient to erect the iron super-
structure upon the erection of satisfactory
stone abutments by the Borough.
This bridge to be kept up and kept
in condition by the district and any
filling of abutments to be done by the
district.

The Miller Road, leading from the lower than bridge across Anderson Creek, in the Borough of Curwensville, to the M. Rice farm, is the narrowest along line of lots of Archie Bloom and Miriam Leach. It is proposed to have the road about 12 ft. of road beds, (as indicated by dotted lines) for use for road purposes which will give the road an offset, a uniform width of 32 ft.
