At a Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace of the county of Clearfield, Pennsylvania, held at Clearfield, in and for said county, on the Seventh day of December, A. D. 1891, before Judge of said Court, upon a petition of sundry inhabitants of the township of Bigler and Beccaria, in said county, setting forth that

Yours petitioners under great inconvenience for want of a public road to lead from a point at the intersection at Fifth and Porter Streets in the village of Chesterfield Township of Bigler to a point on the Glen Hope turnpike near the residence of Samuel Bodle in Beccaria Township.

and therefore praying the Court to appoint proper persons to view and lay out the same according to law, make report to the Court whereupon the Court, upon due consideration had of the premises, do order and appoint Harry Byers Abram Harrick & James Comely who, after being respectively sworn or affirmed to perform the duties of their appointment with impartiality and fidelity, are to view the grounds proposed for said road, and if they view the same and any two of the actual viewers agree that there is occasion for such road, they shall proceed to lay out the same agreeable to the desire of the petitioners, as may be, having respect to the best ground for a road and the shortest distance, and in such manner as to do the least injury to private property, and state particularly, whether they judge the same necessary for a PUBLIC or PRIVATE road, together with a plot or draft of the same, with the courses and distances and reference to the improvements through which it passes, and shall also procure releases of damages from persons through whose lands said road may pass, or failing to procure such releases, shall assess the same, if any sustained, and shall make report thereof to the next court of Quarter Sessions to be held for said county, in which report they shall state that they have been sworn and affirmed according to law. Notice is directed to be given to the owners or occupants of seated lands through which the within road is intended to pass, of the time of the view, according to the 147th Rule of Court.

we, the undersigned, receivers appointed by the within
order of court to view and lay out the road
therein mentioned respectfully report. That we
gave good and lawful notice of said road view
with notice to County Commissioners
and met a^g reliable witness on January 21 1892 and
having been first severally sworn or affirmed
we have viewed and laid out and do return for public use
the following road to wit, beginning at the inter-
section of 5th and Porter streets ^{in the village of} Chestfield
Porter Street south sixty three and one half degrees
West through land of Wallace & Krebs ninety four perches
to a pine stump thence North seventy nine degrees West
through same twenty one and five tenth perches to a dead
Cherry thence through same North sixty eight and one
half degrees West twenty four and six tenth perches
to Post Corner of land belonging to James Mullin and S. M.
Bodle thence by line between said pieces of land
North eighty five and one half degrees West fifty seven
and four tenth perches to a post of road now traveled
thence through land of said S. M. Bodle South thirty two
and one fourth degrees West sixty one perches to point
of said road, thence by said road South twenty two and
one half degrees West sixty seven and eight tenth perches
to a Chestnut thence South fifty three degrees West
seven perches to public road near a Culvert near
residence of Samuel Bodle. A plot or draft of which
road as laid out aforesaid is herunto annexed show-
ing courses distances and improvements, which road
is necessary in our opinion for a public road. We
believe no owner of land is entitled to damages by
reason of locating and opening said road. Witness

N. B.—If the viewers believe the parties are not entitled to damages, taking into consideration the advantages as well as the disadvantages of the road, they will report to the effect.




