To the Honorable Cyrus Gordon

of Clearfield County Pennsylvania. We the under
signed viewers appointed by the within order
of Court to view and layout the road therein
mentioned respectfully report that we
gave good and lawful notice of said road
viewed with notice to County Commissioners of County
afore said and met agreeable thereto and
having been severally sworn or affirmed we
have viewed and laid out and do return for
public use the following road, to wit Beginning

Thence South Twenty one and three fourths Degrees
East. One Hundred Seventy five and one half
feet. to a P. Th. South Seven Degrees and fifty
minutes East. Two Hundred and forty four ft.
to a P. Thence South Four and three fourths Degrees
East. One Hundred four and one half feet to a
post. Thence South Eight Degrees West. One hun
dred twenty seven and one half feet to a P. Thence
South Eighty one and one fourth Degrees East. Seventy
One and two tenths feet. to a post. Th. North Seven
teen Degrees and twenty five minutes East. One and
ninety one feet. to a post. Thence North
four Degrees and Ten minutes East. One Hundred



Which road is necessary in our opinion for a public road. We believe no owner of land through which road laid out passes is entitled to damages, excepting those assessed elsewhere in this report. Road laid out and damages assessed for width of road to be Thirty three feet.

At a Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace of the county of Clearfield, Pennsylvania, held at Clearfield, in and for said county, on the 2nd day of March, A. D. 1896, before Judge of said Court, upon a petition of sundry inhabitants of the township of ~~Burrsid~~ and ~~Chish~~, in said County, setting forth that

They labor under great inconvenience for want of a public Road or Highway to lead from a point near Mary Williams in Burrsid Township on the Public Road leading from Armstrong County to New Washington to connect with the public at or near Elizabeth-Carry in Chish Township

and therefore praying the Court to appoint proper persons to view and lay out the same according to law, ~~Make Report to next Term~~ whereupon the Court upon due consideration had of the premises do order and appoint ~~John Stephenson & John W. M. Greene~~ who, after being respectively sworn or affirmed to perform the duties of their appointment with impartiality and fidelity, are to view the grounds proposed for said road, and if they view the same and any two of the actual viewers agree that there is occasion for such road, they shall proceed to lay out the same agreeable to the desire of the petitioners, as may be, having respect to the best ground for a road and the shortest distance, and in such manner as to do the least injury to private property, and state particularly, whether they judge the same necessary for a PUBLIC or PRIVATE road, together with a plot or draft of the same, with the courses and distances and reference to the improvements through which it passes, and shall also procure releases of damages from persons through whose land said road may pass, or failing to procure such releases, shall assess the same, if any sustained, and shall make report thereof to the next Court of Quarter Sessions to be held for said county, in which report they shall state that they have been sworn and affirmed according to law, Notice is directed to be given to the owners or occupants of seated land through which the within road is intended to pass, of the time of the view, according to the 147th Rule of Court. damages, taking into consideration the advantages as well
as the disadvantages of the road, they will report to that
effect.
