




At a Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace of the county of Clearfield, Pennsylvania, held at Clearfield, in and for said county, on the 6 day of May, A. D. 1895, before Judge of said Court, upon a petition of sundry inhabitants of the township of Houston, in said County, setting forth that

They labor under great inconvenience for want of a public road on highway to lead from New Signs on the Public Road from Bedford to Pleasant Hill or ~~to~~ ^{on} the Public Road from Mill Run to the Mountain ~~at~~ or near James Gaskewau in said (Buff)

and therefore praying the Court to appoint proper persons to view and lay out the same according to law, ~~Report to next term~~
whereupon the Court, upon due consideration had of the premises, do order and appoint Bird W. P. Lyle J. M. Doughty, who, after being respectively sworn or affirmed to perform the duties of their appointment with impartiality and fidelity, are to view the grounds proposed for said road, and if they view the same and any two of the actual viewers agree that there is occasion for such road, they shall proceed to lay out the same agreeable to the desire of the petitioners, as may be, having respect to the best ground for a road and the shortest distance, and in such manner as to do the least injury to private property, and state particularly, whether they judge the same necessary for a PUBLIC or ~~PRIVATE~~ road, together with a plot or draft of the same, with the courses and distances and reference to the improvements through which it passes, and shall also procure releases of damages from persons through whose land said road may pass, or failing to procure such releases, shall assess the same, if any sustained, and shall make report thereof to the next Court of Quarter Sessions to be held for said county, in which report they shall state that they have been sworn and affirmed according to law, Notice is directed to be given to the owners or occupants of seated land through which the within road is intended to pass, of the time of the view, according to the 147th Rule of Court.

 N. B.—If the viewers believe the parties are not entitled to damages, taking into consideration the advantages as well as the disadvantages of the road, they will report to that effect.



Samuel Lee declines to sign a release of damages, and we estimate his damage on the last route at \$175.

James Gucaven declines to sign a release of damages, and we estimate his damages on route numbered three at \$225 and on route numbered four at \$275.

Henry Singer was not present. We estimate his damages on route numbered three at \$50 and on route numbered four at \$100.

There is no settlement in Huston Township beyond the farms of James Gucaven and John Bowen.

The travel passing Henry Singer's to Elk County is not very heavy.

Several citizens of Elk County asked us to lay a road, and we attach their paper. If it is proper for us to answer this, we would say, the correct route for their section of Elk County to reach Penfield and vicinity, would leave the Toby road at the foot of the hill a mile or more beyond Gucaven's and come directly down Wilson Run, the route lying partly in both Counties.

While this shorter route, proposed in this Petition and Order would be a convenience, it is our opinion that the public necessity is not such as would justify the damage to private property, or the payment of the amount necessary to make good the damages.

If the road should be ordered by Court, a full description is found in No.3 of the best route, and in No.4 of the next best route. We file a map as a part of our report.

TO THE HONORABLE CYRUS L. GORDON,

Judge of the Court of Quarter Sessions, Clearfield Co., Pa.

The undersigned viewers on a proposed new road from Henry Singer's to near James Gucaven's, in Huston Township, respectfully report: After being duly sworn they viewed the grounds proposed for said road and made survey as follows: *on Aug. 17 & 19 1895*

1st. From the turn of the present road at the rock near Henry Singer's, marked No. 1 on the accompanying map around to No. 2 on the map, where the road turns Northward again between James Gucaven's and John Bowen's - one mile. This is through old settled and cleared farms by a good road and no severe grades.

2nd. A direct line from No. 1 to No. 2 is $1\frac{1}{4}$ rods less than a quarter of a mile. This is through cleared fields, along the line of Henry Singer and Samuel Lee, and then along line of John Bowen and James Gucaven - Gucaven's being cleared land.

This route is entirely impracticable on account of steep hills on each side of a branch on the last part of the line.

3rd. This route is to begin at the rock. Thence North $4\frac{1}{2}$ deg. East by the red dotted line on the map 15 and 2-10th rods. Then diagonally across Lee's field, North $48\frac{1}{2}$ deg. East 34 and 6-10th rods to a stake in line of Lee and Gucaven. Then North $19\frac{1}{4}$ deg. East, crossing Gucaven's field, 31 and 2-10 rods to the present road, at a stake standing 33 and 7-10th rods Eastward from the turn of the road towards Toby, giving 81 rods of new road, on a good route and easily built.

Samuel Lee objects positively to this route because the only spring on his farm is thus cut off from the principal part of his farm. We consider that this would damage him not less than **\$350.**

4th. A possible route is from the rock North $4\frac{1}{2}$ East 39 rods to Samuel Lee's corner. Thence by line of Lee and Gucaven, South $86\frac{1}{2}$ East 24 and 4-10th rods to a stake. Thence North $19\frac{1}{4}$ deg. East 31 and 2-10th rods to the present road at a stake 33 and 7-10th rods Eastward from the turn of the road towards Toby, giving 94 and 6-10th rods of new road.
