At a Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace of the county of Clearfield, Pennsylvania, held at Clearfield, in and for said county on the 15th day of November, A. D.

1891, before Judge of said Court, upon a petition of sundry inhabitants of the township of Borough Glen Hope in said

County, setting forth that the present wooden

Bridge was built, fifty three years ago (1846) at the present time the Bridge is in a dangerous condition from water running on the North end of the Bridge the timbers are decayed and liable to break down by heavy teams passing over and cause heavy damages to Clearfield County

and therefore praying the Court to appoint proper persons to view and lay out the same according to law, and report to next term of Court whereupon the Court upon due consideration had of the premises, do order and appoint Harry Byers, R.R. Silleming and John Byers

who after being respectively sworn or affirmed to perform their duties impartially and to the best of their judgment, are to view the place proposed for the said bridge, and if they or any two of them, view the same, and any two of the actual viewers agree that there is occasion for such a bridge, and that the erecting of the said bridge would require more expense than it would be reasonable the said townships should bear, they are to make report accordingly;

and a map or plot thereof to be made, which shall accompany said report; the report aforesaid to be made to the next term of the Court of Quarter Sessions to be held for the said county of Clearfield.

To the Honorable Cyrus Gordon, President Judge of the Court of Quarter Sessions of Clearfield County, we, the undersigned viewers appointed by the within order of court to view the bridge herein mentioned respectfully report that we gave notice of said view and met agreeable thereto and having been severally sworn or affirmed we have viewed the said bridge, only the two undersigned viewers being present, and we report further that after carefully examining the bridge aforesaid we are of opinion that it is sufficient strength to be safe for travel and that the erection of a new bridge is not necessary at the present time, we recommend that some repairs be made to the bridge this year to secure it against floods, the abutments need some attention, a few pieces of timber should be put in at the North end, and some shingles are needed.
