



ORDINANCE NO. 30.

An Ordinance provided for the opening of a Public Street in the Borough of Westover, Pa., to extend from High Street to the Public Road leading from Westover to Glen Connell.

Be it enacted and ordained by the Chief Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Westover, Pa., and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same ; That, from and after the passage of this ordinance, High Street in the Borough of Westover be opened and ordained as a Public street, to be thirty-three (33) feet wide and eleven hundred and fifteen (1115) feet long and to extend from High Street in said Borough of Westover to the Public road leading from Westover to Glen Connell.

In testimony whereof that the above ordinance was passed the Second day of August, A. D. 1906, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the official seal of said borough.
