At a Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace of the County of Clearfield, Pa., held at Clearfield, Pa., in and for said County, on the 14th day of April in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-two

By the Honorable Singleton Bell, President Judge of the said Court: Upon the petition of sundry inhabitants of the Township of Burnside, in the County aforesaid setting forth that ... a certain public road in said Twp. beginning at a point on State Highway, about 450 feet south of the residence of Mrs. A W. Patchin and crossing the Susquehanna River and extending to a point at or near the New York Central Railroad Station, all in said Twp. has become useless, and burdensome to the tax payers of said Twp. that the said bridge over the said Susquehanna River is greatly out of repair and in a dangerous condition

and, therefore, praying the Court to appoint proper persons to view and vacate said road between the points mentioned; whereupon the said Court, upon due consideration had of the premises, do order and appoint from and among the County Board of Viewers E.D. Billotte, A. G Kramer, Esq.,

J. S. Michaels who have been duly appointed by the said Court on the County Board of Viewers, and filed their oaths of office in the office of the Court of Common Pleas of the County aforesaid, as required by law and are, therefore, duly qualified to perform the duties of their appointment, with impartiality and according to the best of their judgment; are to view the said road, and after having viewed the same, if they, or a majority of them, do agree that there is no necessity for said road, they shall proceed to vacate the same as agreeably to the desire of the petitioners as may be, and make report thereof to the next Court of Quarter Sessions to be held in and for said County, stating particularly whether there is any necessity for said road, or whether the same should be vacated; and the reason why, together with a plot, or draft, thereof showing the courses and distances with reference to the improvements through which said road passes.

And in case the viewers aforesaid shall decide in favor of vacating said road, they shall obtain from the persons through whose lands the said road passes, or otherwise affected, or damaged, by the vacating of said road, releases from whatever damage they may sustain by the vacation of said road; and in case the owners of such lands, or persons affected, thereby refuse to release their claim to damages, the said Viewers shall assess the same, taking into consideration the advantages, as well as the disadvantages, arising from the vacation of said road; and make report of such assessment; which report they shall in like manner transmit to the next Court of Quarter Sessions, with the draft, or plot, aforesaid. In which said reports they shall state that they have been sworn, or affirmed, according to law, and that due and legal notice was given of the time when and the place where they would meet, to view said road and the time and place of hearing.

RETURN OF VIEWERS.

TO THE HONORABLE THE JUDGE OF QUARTER SESSIONS OF THE PEACE, IN AND FOR THE

We, the undersigned Viewers, duly appointed by your Honorable Court by the foregoing order, from and among the County Board of Viewers who have been duly appointed by your Honorable Court and have filed their oaths of office in the Court of Common Pleas of Clearfield County, beg leave to report as follows:

That notice of the time of the view and of the hearing day was duly served according to law upon the Commissioners of Clearfield County, and the Board of Supervisors of the Township of Burnside ----- and that Three ----- notices thereof were posted along the route of the said road to be vacated, that the said view would be held on the

18th day of July -----, A. D. 1922, and that the public hearing, as required by the Act of Assembly, and the Rules of Court, would be held in the Arbitration Room in the Court House, in Clearfield,

Pa., on the 20th -- day of July ----- A. D., 1922, at nine o'clock A. M., and that said Viewers, appointed by the said order, viewed the road desired to be vacated, and that there were present at the view

parties interested, either in favor of or against vacating said road. And that the aforesaid hearing was held in the Arbitration Room in the Court House, in Clearfield, Pa., on the 20th day of July; -----,

A. D. 1922, when the parties interested in the said road were in attendance: John Patchin, Carl, Patchin, Arthur Fry, George M Young, P. E. Smith and Elmer Leasure parties opposed to vacating said road and John Nowary one of the Supervisors with W. C. Millier Esq, of Millier and Hartswick Attorneys for the Supervisors of Burnside Township; -----

And that after the view and hearing above mentioned, the undersigned Viewers do agree that said road has not, become useless, inconvenient and burdensome. They find the facts as follows. That this is a short piece of road, not over one third of a mile in length, and not an expensive road to keep up; the only objection to keeping up said road or reason why the Supervisors wish to have said road vacated is on account of a bridge on said road across the Susquehanna River which has been in arbad condition; said bridge is about fifty(50) feet in length and the Supervisors claim they are not in a financial condition to repair said bridge and put it in a good safe condition; said road leads from the State Highway near Patchinville which leads from Burnside to the Town of Cherry Tree to the Railroad Station of Patchin, on the New York Central Railroad on the oposite side of the river from the village of Patchinville and a general settlement in that vicinity and the only road to the said Railroad Station and the only side track or shipping point between Burnside and Cherry Tree a distance of nine miles, and a very convenient point for shipping out of mine ties, mine props and other material and for the farmers living on the East side of the river for shipping in lime and other furtilizers. Besides, parties residing in Patchinville and in that vicinity will not have much over one third of a mile to the Railroad Station but if vacated or done away with they will have over a mile

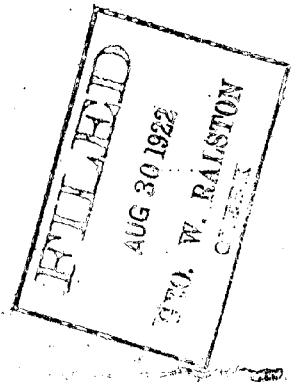

To the Honorable Singleton Bell, President Judge, and to the
Viewers Appointed by the Court:-

The undersigned residents of Burnside Township,
Clearfield County, respectfully protest against the proposed
vacation of the public road leading from a point on the State
highway about four hundred fifty feet South of the residence of
Mrs. A. W. Patchin to a point at or near the railroad station
on the New York Central Railroad, for the following reasons:-

- (1). That said road runs from the main highway between
Burnside and Cherry Tree to a railroad siding at the station of
Patchin on the New York Central Railroad.
- (2). That said railroad siding is the only one between
Burnside and Cherry Tree, a distance of nine miles.
- (3). That it is essential for the interest of farmers and
others resident along said nine miles of highway and back thereof,
to have railroad facilities, and they will be denied such
facilities by vacation of the highway and will as a result be un-
able to get supplies and unable to enjoy the business and social
comforts afforded as a result of the railroad connection.
- (4). That the highway is less than 1000 feet in
length and its upkeep is not burdensome to the tax payers of
Burnside Township; and the bridge over the Susquehanna river
forming a part of the highway sought to be vacated can be put in
ordinarily good condition at small expense.
