

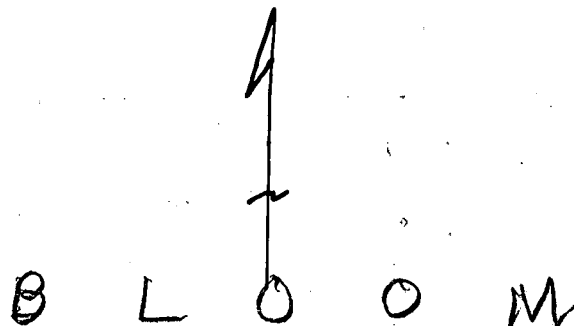

CLEARFIELD COUNTY, SS:

At a Court of Quarter Sessions, of the Peace of the County of Clearfield, held at Clearfield town, in and for said county, on the 20th day of

June A. D. 1866 before the Judges of the said Court upon the petition of sundry inhabitants of the township of *Blouin* in the said county, setting forth that they labor under great inconvenience for the want of a road or highway to lead from *the Pennville*

turmpike to the Foley House now owned by John McIntire.

Report as to Damages

and therefore praying the Court to appoint proper persons to view and lay out the same according to law. **Whereupon** the Court, upon due consideration had of the premises, do order and appoint

Thomas Moore, John Smith and W. M. Anderson

who, after being respectively sworn or affirmed to perform the duties of their appointment with impartiality and fidelity, are to view the ground proposed for said road, and if any two of them agree that there is occasion for such road, they shall proceed to lay out the same, as agreeable to the desire of the petitioners as may be, having respect for the best ground for a road, and the shortest distance, in such manner as to do the least injury to private property; and shall make report thereof, stating particularly whether they judge the same necessary for a public or private road, together with a plot or draft thereof, and the courses and distances, and reference to the improvements through which it may pass, to the next Court of Quarter Sessions to be held for the said county. In which report they shall state that they have been sworn or affirmed according to law.

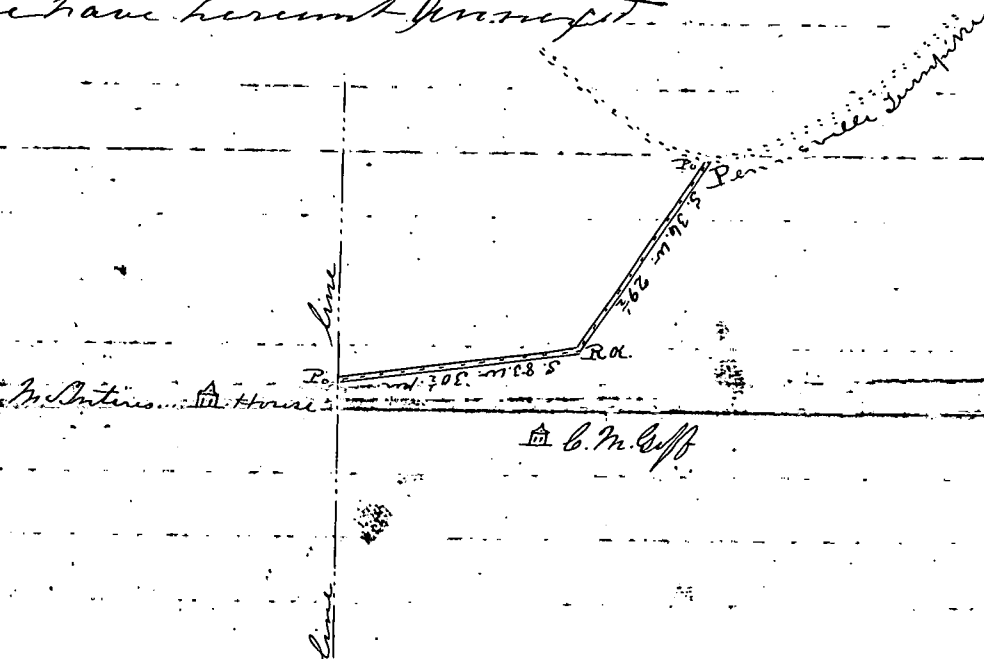
