

ROAD VIEWER'S REPORT.

CLEARFIELD COUNTY, SS:

At a Court of Quarter Sessions of the County of Clearfield, held at Clearfield, in and for said county, on the 21 day of March, A. D., 1870, before the Judges of the said Court, upon the petition of sundry inhabitants of the township of Union, in the said county, setting forth that they labor under great inconvenience for the want of a road or highway, leading from

at or near Mons Saw Mill to Rockton

Report as to Damages &c

And therefore praying the Court to appoint proper persons to view and lay out the same, according to law. Whereupon, the Court, upon due consideration had of the premises, do order and appoint

Geo. C. Kirk, H. B. Bailey & J. R. Arnold

who, after being respectively sworn or affirmed to perform the duties of their appointment with impartiality and fidelity, are to view the ground proposed for said road; and if any two of them agree that there is occasion for such road they shall proceed to lay out the same, as agreeably to the desire of the petitioners as may be, having respect for the best ground for a road, and the

shortest distance, in such manner as to do the least injury to private property; and shall make report thereof, stating particularly whether they judge the same necessary for a public or private road, together with a plot or draft thereof, and the courses and distances, with reference to the improvements through which it may pass, to the next Court of Quarter Sessions to be held for said county. In which report they shall state that they have been sworn or affirmed according to law.

To the Honourable the Judges within named:
Or the persons appointed by the within order
of Court, to view and lay out the road therein
Mentioned, do report that in pursuance of
Said order, after having given due notice
of the time and place of said view, and hav-
ing, also been duly sworn according to law,
We have viewed and laid out and do return
for Public use, the following road, Viz:-
Beginning at a Post, in Township Road Near
Mon's Saw mill, thence North, Twenty three
Perches to a Hemlock, thence North Four and one-
half Degrees East, Thirteen and one-fourth Perches
to a Pine tree, thence North, Twenty Nine Degrees
East, Fourteen Perches, to a Maple tree, thence Nor-
th, Fifty and one half Degrees East, Sixteen Perches
to a Post, in line between Bloom and Union Lps.
thence by said line East, Eighty Perches to
a White Oak tree, thence North, Fifty-five degrees
East, Forty-eight and seven-tenths Perches, to a
Beech tree, thence North, Twenty degrees
East, sixty Perches, to a Post, thence North, one
hundred and Thirty-nine Perches to a stone
corner, thence North Thirty-six degrees East,
one hundred and twelve Perches, to a Post,
thence North, Fifteen degrees East, Forty-eight
Perches, to a Post, thence North, Forty-two Per-
ches to a Post, in Public road, at Rockton,
a Plot or draft whereof is herewith annexed,
and we, having made careful inquiry, whe-
ther damages would result to any one by
reason of said road passing through their

lands, do find that no damaged result to any
one. In testimony whereof we have hereunto

ember A.D. 1870.
