



COMPLAINT IN DIVORCE.

1. DONALD L. CONRAD is the Plaintiff, and BARBARA A. CONRAD is the defendant in this action of divorce.
2. The plaintiff is twenty-three years of age and the defendant is twenty-two years of age, and neither is mentally incompetent.
3. Plaintiff and defendant were lawfully married in the City of Du Bois, Clearfield County, Pennsylvania, on the 28th day of November, 1959, by Merritt I. Edner, an alderman in and for the said City of Du Bois, Clearfield County, Pennsylvania.
4. The parties to this action had no children born of their marriage.
5. Plaintiff was born in the City of Du Bois, Pennsylvania, and defendant was born in Curwensville, Pennsylvania; both residents of the City of Du Bois, Pennsylvania, at and prior to the date of their marriage. The plaintiff now resides at No. 547, West Long Avenue, Du Bois, Pennsylvania, and the defendant resides at No. 925 $\frac{1}{2}$ Pancoast Street, Reynoldsville, Pennsylvania.
6. The plaintiff has resided in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania during his whole lifetime, that is, for more than twenty-three years immediately prior to bringing this action of divorce.
7. The defendant has offered such indignities to the person of the plaintiff as to render his condition intolerable and his life burdensome.
8. The plaintiff is the innocent and injured spouse.

TO THE HONORABLE JOHN J. PENTZ, PRESIDENT JUDGE OF THE SAID COURT:

The undersigned Commissioner appointed by your Honorable Court to take testimony and report the same with form of Decree in the above entitled action respectfully represents:

I. COMMISSION.

II. DOCKET ENTRIES AND SCHEDULE.

1. Complaint in Divorce filed on April 21, 1961.

2. On April 24th, 1961, at 4:00 o'clock P. M.,

Robert N. Colley, Constable, served the within Complaint in Divorce on BARBARA A. CONRAD, by handing to her personally, a certified copy of said Complaint in Divorce, at her residence, to wit, 925½ Pancoast Street, Reynoldsville, Pennsylvania.

3. On July 18th, 1961, by Motion on the Watch Book, John A. Cherry, Esq., was appointed Master to take the testimony and report the same with form of decree.

4. Master's Hearing was appointed for Tuesday, August 8th, 1961, at 1:00 o'clock P.M., D.S.T., in the offices of Gleason, Cherry & Cherry, 109 North Brady Street, DuBois, Pennsylvania.

5. Notice of hearing was served on the above named Defendant, BARBARA A. CONRAD, personally, at her residence, to wit, 925½ Pancoast Street, Reynoldsville, Pennsylvania, by

Robert N. Colley, Constable, on the 20th day of July, 1961, at or about the hour of 11:30 A.M., E.D.S.T.

6. That at the time and place for hearing having arrived, there appeared before your Master, Eugene D. Valley, Attorney for said Plaintiff; and DONALD L. CONRAD, Plaintiff. The Defendant did not appear nor was she represented by counsel.

III. COMPLAINT AND FILED PAPERS.

IV. CAUSES OF DIVORCE. Indignities to the person of the Plaintiff.

V. FINDINGS OF FACT.

1. Marriage - The said Plaintiff and defendant were married on the 28th day of November, 1959, in the City of DuBois, Clearfield County, Pennsylvania.

2. Residence - The Plaintiff has resided in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania continuously since birth. The present residence of the Plaintiff being 547 West Long Avenue, DuBois, Pennsylvania and the present residence of the Defendant being 925½ Pancoast Street, Reynoldsville, Pennsylvania.

3. Citizenship - The Plaintiff and Defendant are both natural born citizens of the United States.

4. Age and occupation - The Plaintiff is 23 years of age and is a laborer at the Beaver Meadow Creamery, DuBois, Pennsylvania. The Defendant is 22 years old and is a housewife, having no other occupation.

5. Children - No children were born as a result of said marriage.

6. Armed Forces - Neither the Plaintiff nor the Defendant is a member of the Armed Forces of the United States.

7. Findings on the Merits and Discussion - The following was established by the evidence: Although the ground for divorce is not desertion, the parties have been separated since some time in March of 1960. This separation was solely the result of the Defendant's activities. It appears that the Defendant continued to keep company with her first husband, and that this was open and notorious. In fact, he did bring her home at one and two o'clock in the mornings, after her absence from the home from early evening. Although Plaintiff coaxed his wife to give up her friendship with her first husband, she refused to do so; in fact, removing her furniture from the home. The Defendant personally declared that she did not love the Plaintiff and that she should never have married him. Although the Plaintiff gave the Defendant no cause for her actions, she persisted in them. It is important, too, that the Defendant has never brought an action for non-support, although the Plaintiff has supplied no support since she left their home in March of 1960. The Plaintiff, as a result of his wife's actions, which were common talk, was much embarrassed by the same; and affected him to his detriment. The Master feels that the testimony establishes a case of Indignities to the Person, entitling the Plaintiff to a divorce.

VI. CONCLUSIONS OF LAW.

1. Your Commissioner finds that the proceedings in this action are in accordance with the requirements of law and rules of court.

2. The Court has jurisdiction of the action and the parties.

3. Good and sufficient grounds for divorce has

been established by the evidence.

VII. RECOMMENDATIONS:

Your Master recommends that a divorce be granted to the Plaintiff and against the Defendant on the grounds of Indignities to the Person of the Plaintiff.

DONALD L. CONRAD, being duly sworn according to law, testified as follows:

BY MR. VALLEY:

Q. What is your name?

A. Donald L. Conrad.

Q. Are you the husband of Barbara A. Conrad, the defendant in this divorce case?

A. Yes, I am.

Q. When and where did you marry Barbara Conrad?

A. We were married November 28th, 1959, by Merritt Edner, here in Du Bois.

Q. What is your present residence and post office address?

A. I live at No. 547 West Long Avenue, Du Bois, Pennsylvania.

Q. How long have you lived there?

A. Since we separated, some time in March of 1960.

Q. Where were you born?

A. Out at Salem?

Q. Is that Salem in Brady Township, Clearfield County?

A. Yes.

Q. How long have you lived in the State of Pennsylvania?

A. All my life.

Q. Where were you living when you were married?

A. I lived with my mother in Du Bois, 547 West Long Avenue?

Q. Where did you and your wife live immediately following your marriage?

A. We lived above Ready's Market on First Street.

Q. How long did you live there together?

A. We lived on First Street until we separated.

Q. Where was your wife born?

A. In Curwensville, I believe.

Q. Where did she live before your marriage?

A. On Juniata Street.

Q. In Du Bois, Pennsylvania.

A. Yes, in Du Bois.

Q. Where is your wife living now?

A. She is living at 925½ Pancoast Street, Reynoldsville, Pa.

Q. And you and your wife are both native born citizens of the United States?

A. That is correct.

Q. What is your age and present occupation?

A. I am 23 years old, and I work at the Beaver Meadow Creamery on Maple Avenue.

Q. What is your wife's age and present occupation?

A. She is 22 years old, and has no occupation that I know of.

Q. Have you and your wife any children?

A. No.

Q. Is your wife in the armed forces of the United States?

A. No she is not in any service.

Q. Has she ever been in such service?

A. No, never

Q. Are you in the armed services?

A. Yes, in the Army Reserve.

Q. Not on active duty?

A. No, I am not.

Q. Is this your first marriage?

A. Yes.

Q. Is it your wife's first marriage?

A. She was married and divorced before our marriage.

Q. How did you get along together when you were first married?

A. We got along good, or I thought we were getting along together.

Q. When did you find that you were not getting along good?

A. About the first of March?

Q. What did you learn at that time?

A. My wife had been going to visit a girl friend in the neighborhood, and her first husband would be there at the same time; then the girl later would take my wife to meet him at other places. It

finally got to the point where he would bring her home at night and I would see him in the car.

Q. What time would he bring her home?

A. One or two in the morning.

Q. How often did this occur?

A. Several times in the last month we lived together he brought her home at 2:30 or 3:00 A. M.

Q. When she went to visit her girl friend what time would she come home?

A. She would leave about seven or seven-thirty in the evening and come back around eleven.

Q. How did you learn she had been seeing her former husband at the friend's home.

A. I was told by neighbors after we separated.

Q. Did she ever admit to you that she was going with her ex-husband?

A. Yes. I had seen him bring her home at night and we talked about it several times before we broke up. I was laid off and decided to move into some rooms at my mother's house. I asked her to come with me and forget the other man, and she refused. I asked why and she said someone else wanted her, and she wanted to go back to him. I told her I was moving and that it would be all right for her to come and live at my mother's if she forgot the other fellow, and she said she would come and get her own furniture there. When I would ask why she was doing it, she would say someone else wanted her.

Q. Did the ex-husband ever come to your home?

A. Yes, when I had reserve meetings he would come to the house. My wife had a child by her first marriage and he would come to visit the child, but he would come in the evening when I was not at home, and I knew that he stayed past the child's bed time.

Q. How many times did you and your wife talk about her seeing the other man before you separated?

A. Three times in the last week we lived together. She was out with him every night that week and didn't even come home. On Thursday she said she would

be back after things on Saturday.

Q. Did you then move into your mother's house?

A. Yes.

Q. Do you remember some of the things she said to you concerning your marriage, before the separation?

A. Yes, she said she didn't love me and that she never should have married me in the first place, and that she should have kept her first husband.

Q. Anything else?

A. She said her love life was taken care of by the other fellow.

Q. Did you ever ask for an explanation of where she had been at the times she came home in the early morning hours?

A. I asked but I never got a straight answer. But I would see him drop her off in front of the store, Roady's Market.

Q. Did you see him?

A. Yes, I recognized the car and actually saw him driving.

Q. Did you support your wife?

A. Yes, I paid the bills and bought the groceries and any thing else that was needed.

Q. Did she complain about the way you supported her or treated her?

A. No. She had no reason to do that.

Q. Did you give her any cause to take up with this other man?

A. No. There was no reason at all.

Q. Have you seen your wife since you separated from her?

A. Yes, many times.

Q. Have you seen her with her ex-husband?

A. Yes, I have seen them together many times. They live in the same house in Reynoldsville and every one knows that they plan to re-marry.

Q. Are they living together?

A. I do not know, except that they live in the same house. I dont know who else is there or how many bed-rooms there are in the place.

Q. Have you talked to her since the separation?

A. No.

Q. Did she ever have you arrested for non-support?

A. No, she did not.

Q. Could you have continued living together under these conditions?

A. No. Not so long as she was going out with her ex-husband. No one could put up with that.

Q. And you did ask her to stop seeing him before you separated?

A. Yes, several times.

Q. And she refused?

A. She did.

Q. Have your family and friends made any comment on the separation and the conduct of your wife?

A. Yes, it is common talk. Some one is always telling me about seeing them together.

Q. How does this affect you?

A. It is always embarrassing, but not so much as before I started the divorce.

Q. Did you make a sincere effort to break up your wife's relationship with her ex-husband?

A. I did everything that I could possibly do. I was satisfied with my marriage until my wife decided that she wanted her former husband. We could have got along together if he hadn't come back into the picture
