The petition of the undersigned in-
habitants of the village of Newbrough, in
~~the Parish of St. John's~~ respectfully
represents: That the said town or village
contains a collection of houses, collocated after
a regular plan in regard to streets and
lanes, and that the petitioners reside within
the limits thereof, as hereafter set forth and
described, and that the same contains not
more than one hundred families -
that they are desirous that said village
should be incorporated by the said Court
with the Borough of Newbrough, ac-
cording to the following boundaries viz: Begin-
ning at an Oak on the line between
Newbrough Borough and Church Townships,
thence East twenty perches to an ash - thence
North forty-eight degrees East to post - thence
South eighty-six and one half degrees East
fifty-seven perches to a stone - thence South-
thirty degrees East twenty-two and one half
degrees to a stone - thence South seventy-one and
one half degrees East twenty perches to a post -
thence North eleven and one half degrees East
thirty and one half perches to a post - thence South
twenty degrees East sixteen and eight inches
perches to a post - thence South seventy-nine degrees
East - fifteen perches to a post - thence seventy-
nine and three fourths degrees East one and
one half perches to a post - thence South
