**Clearfield County, Pa.**

At a Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace of the county of Clearfield, held at Clearfield, in and for said county, on the 23<sup>rd</sup> day of November A. D.

1881, before Judges of said Court, upon a petition of sundry inhabitants of the Township of Greenwood Penn in said county, setting forth that at January Term of said Court of Quarter Sessions 1881 a Report of review of Public road leading from Cherry Tree to Coudensville was confirmed absolutely. That in said report a part of the then and now travelled public road viz from a point at or near Jas Johnson & Sons Woolen Mill to a point at or near Penn Indps line was supplied by a new road, that this new road has been opened in part by work done thereon - Your petitioners further represent that the new road thus laid out is not laid out on the best route but if opened will be of great expense + burdensome to maintain - Your petitioners therefore pray a review to vacate & supply the same by a road to begin at or near Johnsons Woolen Mill & from thence by the best route to a point at or near Penn Indps line in the public road leading to Coudensville and therefore praying the Court to appoint proper persons to view and lay out the same according to law, And make Report to Court

whereupon the Court, upon due consideration had of the premises, do order and appoint J. W. Moore Richard Freeman & John McDermott who, after being respectively sworn or affirmed to perform the duties of their appointment with impartiality and fidelity, are to view the grounds proposed for said road, and if they view the same and any two of the actual viewers agree that there is occasion for such road, they shall proceed to lay out the same agreeable to the desire of the petitioners, as may be, having respect to the best ground for a road and the shortest distance, and in such manner as to do least injury to private property, and state particularly whether they judge the same necessary for a public or private road, together with a plot or draft of the same, with the courses and distances and reference to the improvements through which it passes, and shall also procure releases of damages from persons through whose lands said road may pass, or failing to procure such releases, shall assess the same, if any sustained, and shall make report thereof to the next Court of Quarter Sessions to be held for the said county, in which report they shall state that they have been sworn and affirmed according to law. Notice is directed to be given to the owners or occupants of seated lands through which the within road is intended to pass, of the time of the view, according to the 147th rule of Court.

N. B.—If the viewers believe the parties are not entitled to damages, taking into consideration the advantages as well as the disadvantages of the road, they will report to that effect.

# Clearfield County

At a Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace of the county of Clearfield, held at Clearfield, in and for said county, on the Seventh day of June A. D. 1880, before Judges of said Court, upon a petition of sundry inhabitants of the Township of Pelle Pema Gremium Belleville and Sunside in said county, setting forth that they labor under a great inconvenience from the fact that the present road leading from Belleville to the Cherry Tree is located on hilly and rough ground where the grade is so great in many places it is almost impossible to surmount them with loaded teams a portion of the road near R. C. Thompson in the spring of the year on account of the Ice Jorges and drift being washed in by high water

and therefore praying the Court to appoint proper persons to view and lay out the same according to law,

whereupon the Court, upon due consideration had of the premises, do order and appoint S. J. McCloskey H. D. McCracken & A. W. Moore who, after being respectively sworn or affirmed to perform the duties of their appointment with impartiality and fidelity, are to view the grounds proposed for said road; and if they view the same and <sup>locate & supply</sup> any two of the actual viewers agree that there is occasion for such road; they shall proceed to lay out the same agreeable to the desire of the petitioners, as may be, having respect to the best ground for a road and the shortest distance, and in such manner as to do least injury to private property, and state particularly whether they judge the same necessary for a public or private road, together with a plot or draft of the same, with the courses and distances and reference to the improvements through which it passes, and shall also procure releases of damages from persons through whose lands said road may pass, or failing to procure such releases, shall assess the same, if any sustained, and shall make report thereof to the next Court of Quarter Sessions to be held for the said county, in which report they shall state that they have been sworn and affirmed according to law. Notice is directed to be given to the owners or occupants of seated lands through which the within road is intended to pass, of the time of the view, according to the 147th rule of Court.
